Over the past several years, we've been learning new terms/phrases, haven't we? For instance, take the phrase "alternate facts." Okay, let's not go down that rabbit hole! But what about "polar vortex"? I don't remember that term from my growing up years. It got cold, but I don't remember ever hearing that term until a couple of years ago. While I probably didn't pay as much attention to things such as this in my early years, I still feel that weather patterns have been changing over the last decade or so.

We have terms and phrases in the church that can seem just as unfamiliar. In the bible studies I've led over several years, I've tried to teach each new term. For instance, I have tried to share the finer points of eschatology, apocalypticism and about the parousia.\* Weird and unfamiliar terms, right? But there are a host of terms that we are quite familiar with. Grace, mercy, justice, faith, and hope are just a few of the terms we deal with on a fairly regular basis.

On February 2, the lectionary cycle includes a reading about one of our most often used terms – love! The famous Chapter 13 of the first letter to the Corinthians is all about love and is most often only heard at weddings. What a shame that we only hear "and now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love" when two people stand before an altar to be joined in matrimony. Paul didn't write these words as a wedding sermon. He was calling a body of believers to their true vocation. They were to love one another. He was telling them that their love – like Christ's love – could bear all things, it could believe all things and that it would never end.

I like to think this comes in February, the month we focus on "love," for a reason. Greeting card companies (and certain ones with movie studios attached to them) are counting on us to focus on love this month. They want us to celebrate romantic love. That is not a bad thing! According to legend, it was matrimonial type of love that was associated with St. Valentine. Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform

marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. So, celebrating that type of love has been associated with the "holiday" ever since.

I'm not sure Paul had all of this in mind when he wrote his letter to the Corinthians. He did, however, want them to share a bond of mutual love that would sustain their fledgling community. It is that same kind of bond that has cemented the First Congregational Church these past two hundred-plus years and, God willing, will be more than enough to sustain us in the coming two hundred years.

\* Eschatology is the study of the "end times," apocalypticism is a religious belief in an apocalypse (which simply means something that is hidden), and the parousia is the second coming of Christ.



Christ's Closet is a ministry of the Eastwood Church of the Brethren on Darrow Road just south of Eastwood. They provide clean, gently used clothing to those in need. They currently need coats, jackets, hats, and gloves for men, women, and children. During December, their closet was opened twice. On Dec. 21st, there were 69 in attendance plus an additional 40 shopped for. Dec. 7th had 68 in attendance and an additional 102 shopped for. They typically give away approximately 1200 -1500 pieces of clothing. Their closet is now open one day a month. A box will be set up in the Atrium for folks to provide donations.



#### **SUPER BOWL SUBS**


