



April 2025 operating income of \$32,550 was \$200 below the monthly income need. Operating expenses for the month were \$34,200 resulting in a **deficit** of (\$1,650) in April, and a YTD surplus of \$20,965. A Week of Service in Cincinnati

From June 8–12, a team of 10 youth and 4 adults from United Ministry will travel to Cincinnati, Ohio, to serve with Washington UCC's Summer Immersion Program.



This mission experience offers our youth a chance to engage in hands-on service grounded in faith and community partnership.

Throughout the week, the team will lead enrichment activities for children in the urban core, assist with home repairs, support a global disaster relief project, and volunteer at a local emergency shelter. They are also organizing a food and hygiene drive to support Washington UCC's pantry and closet, which serves individuals experiencing homelessness. A highlight of the week will be preparing and serving a community meal.

In addition to their service, our youth will take part in faith-based programming that provides a biblical foundation for their mission work. We ask for your continued prayers as our team travels and seeks to be the hands and feet of Christ, sharing love in tangible ways and witnessing God's movement in the lives of those they serve—and within their own hearts.
